

#### The 21st army group, First Canadian army & 2nd British Army in Northern Europe 1944-1945

Subsequent to Operation Overlord (the D-Day invasions) they were used by the 21st Army Group in most operations through to the final occupation of Germany.

Interestingly the authors Mk1 has substantial old welding marks in the centre of the back plate which may have been for the fitment of the spare wheel. Early cars had no spare wheel fitment as standard so this would presumably have been a field modification.
























